But in this time of crisis unexpected events take place; We currently receive 20-30 calls each day from retired pharmacists, industry pharmacists, students, etc. who say that they want to help and offer to work in any community pharmacy. This is fantastic news and to me it shows the strong

professional ethics and morals of pharmacists.

You can also find a wealth of information on COVID-19 on the website of the International Pharmaceutical Federation (FIP), www.fip.org. At the global level FIP is doing a tremendous job in putting together recommendations and collecting information on what is done in different countries and what can be done, to function as a repository for guidance and for ideas. Following the impressive work of the COVID-19 Guidance Task Force a COVID-19 Expert Advisory Group has recently been established that will be able to advise on many different aspects of the pandemic.
