The Taskforce will host a side meeting at the Second Global Forum on Human Resources for Health taking place in Bangkok, Thailand, on 25-29th January 2011. In addition, a case story we submitted entitled, 'Quality Assurance in Education: A cornerstone for strengthening the pharmacy workforce' will be presented during the conference. As you may be aware, the FIP Pharmacy Education Taskforce was launched at the First Global Forum in Kampala, Uganda, in 2008. So we are very excited to be involved in the second forum and to be able to share all the work we've achieved since then! Post-Congress 2010

The FIP Pharmacy Education Taskforce hosted a full day, pre-satellite workshop entitled **"R1: How to Develop Academic Capacity to Ensure Seamless Education"** held on Saturday, 28th August 2010, prior to the 70th FIP World Congress of Pharmacy/Pharmaceutical Sciences in Lisbon, Portugal.

Around 50 participants attended the workshop, which consisted of an "ideas showcase" of oral and poster presentations, debates and group discussions. During the final part of the workshop, participants were asked to create a roadmap for pharmacy education to reflect the lifelong learning journey. The session aimed to stimulate discussion on the global issues of seamless education.

The roadmaps have been transformed from flip chart to graphic form. It consists of five different roadmaps for pharmacy education, including interesting new ideas, intriguing concepts and a great sounding board for discussion here on the COP. The world health report - Health systems financing: the path to universal coverage

In this report, the World Health Organization maps out what countries can do to modify their financing systems so they can move more quickly towards the goal of universal coverage and sustain the gains that have been achieved. The report builds on new research and lessons learnt from country experience. It provides an action agenda for countries at all stages of development and proposes ways that the international community can better support efforts in low income countries to achieve universal coverage and improve health outcomes. http://www.who.int/whr/2010/en/index.html

Monitoring the building blocks of health systems: a handbook of indicators and their measurement strategies

Increased attention to the strengthening of health systems would not be sustainable in the absence of a sound monitoring strategy that enables decision-makers to accurately track health progress and performance, evaluate impact, and ensure accountability at country and global levels. This handbook describes a set of indicators and related measurement strategies, structured around the WHO framework that describes health systems in terms of six "building blocks": service delivery, health workforce, information, medicines, financing and governance.
