Being present in Geneva during the most important event on the health governance calendar enabled us to foster our relationship with the World Health Organization (WHO), and provided an invaluable opportunity to witness, network, and influence global health policies, while championing the critical role of pharmacists, pharmacy educators and pharmaceutical scientists in global health.

As well as attending the three FIP side events, as described in detail in section 3.1, these delegates became FIP's eyes and ears at more than 80 side events organised by other stakeholders. Without their commitment and dedication, it would not be possible to present this report showcasing FIP's presence at the most important global healthcare event annually.

Executive summary

The 79th WHA marked a significant event for FIP, with participation from the delegation, composed of 55 committed individuals, including members of the FIP Board, representatives from Member Organisations (MOs), FIP constituencies, Early Career Pharmacy Group (ECPG) members, the chief operating officer (COO) and members of the FIP team.

FIP delivered six individual statements and three constituency statements to the WHO member states, advocating for the role of pharmacists in addressing key global health priorities, including antimicrobial resistance (AMR), substandard and falsified medical products, public health and social measures, health in the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, communicable diseases, immunisation Agenda 2030, mental health, and universal health coverage (UHC). These interventions are closely aligned with FIP's priority programmes, vision and mission.

During WHA79, FIP hosted its own three side events:

- 18 May 2026: Self-care is essential for primary health care (PHC): Pharmacists are critical for self-care and UHC.
- 19 May 2026: Addressing the impact of complex crises on global health through safe and sustainable access to medicines and strengthening pharmaceutical contributions to humanitarian action.
- 20 May 2026: Implementing the WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC) and wider non-communicable disease (NCD) prevention targets by integrating the pharmacy workforce.

These high-level side events highlighted FIP's leadership in areas such as PHC, UHC, self-care, tobacco control and NCDs, pharmacy-based vaccination (PBV), humanitarian response, and access to medicines.

FIP also supported side events organised by the Taiwan Society of Health-System Pharmacists (TSHP) and the International Pharmaceutical Students' Federation (IPSF). FIP Board members and FIP representatives presented at 15 side events organised by the World Health Professions Alliance (WHPA), European Migraine and Headache Alliance, Global Action on Men's Health, International Federation of Pharmaceutical Manufacturers and Associations (IFPMA), Global Self-Care Federation (GSCF), World Medical Association (WMA), Global Respiratory Infection Partnership (GRIP), and the Commonwealth Pharmacist Association (CPA). FIP's participation highlighted its continued commitment to advocating for the pharmacy profession at the highest level of global health. By voicing the evidence of impact of its global network, FIP ensured that pharmacy's contributions to public health, immunisation, access to medicines, and health workforce sustainability were recognised and valued by international stakeholders.

Strategic meetings were also held to outline the impact of collaboration and strengthened relationships with WHO on the imperatives to advancing global health goals.

This report is made up of several sections highlighting different aspects of FIP's participation at the 79th WHA.

1 FIP Delegation at WHA79

The 79th WHA was held in Geneva, Switzerland, on 18–23 May 2026. The theme of this year's Assembly was **Reshaping global health: a shared responsibility**.

Director-General Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus's [opening remarks at the 79th WHA](#) highlighted WHO's transformation across three core areas: strengthening science and normative functions, enhancing global health emergency preparedness, and reforming its financing model to build a more resilient and independent organisation. He emphasised major initiatives including the WHO Academy, the World Health Data Hub, investments in artificial intelligence and digital health, the WHO Hub for Pandemic and Epidemic Intelligence, the Pandemic Fund, and the WHO Pandemic Agreement. Looking ahead, he stressed the importance of continued organisational reform, sustainable financing, stronger national health sovereignty, and reshaping the global health architecture through greater global solidarity and shared responsibility.

The WHA79 hosted a series of side events, including [62 official events](#) at the WHO headquarters and the United Nations (UN) Palais de Nations. These side events covered various topics in line with the [14th Global Programme of Work of WHO](#):

- i) respond to climate change, an escalating health threat;
- ii) address determinants of health and root causes of ill health;
- iii) advance the primary healthcare approach and essential health system capacities for universal health coverage;
- iv) improve health service coverage and financial protection;
- v) prevent, mitigate and prepare for health risks from all hazards; and,
- vi) rapidly detect and sustain response to health emergencies.

1.1 FIP delegation at WHA79

The WHA serves as a prominent global gathering, bringing together health ministers, governmental authorities, health policymakers, health-related non-government organisations (NGOs), industry representatives, and WHO policy and technical officers. Alongside the WHA, numerous meetings and side events were held in various locations across Geneva, offering opportunities for networking and influencing policymaking. These events, though less formal and on a smaller scale, provided valuable avenues for engagement.

The official FIP delegation comprised the WHO limit of six delegates, including three representatives from the FIP Early Career Pharmaceutical Group (ECPG) and three FIP team members. These official delegates actively participated in the WHA meetings, delivering pre-scripted and agreed-upon statements on behalf of FIP with access to the Palais des Nations and WHO headquarters, and able to contribute to strategic roundtables and events held here.

Apart from the official delegates playing a vital role in the WHA proceedings, the full delegation included a broader representation of FIP leadership, organisations in membership, and FIP constituencies, fostering engagement and collaboration with key stakeholders. This inclusive approach provided organisations in membership with a valuable opportunity to engage with their respective countries' representatives, ministers, and WHO officials, fostering meaningful interactions during the WHA side events and receptions.

All delegates were invited to a welcome supper. This took place on 17 May 2026 at 7pm at Café du Soleil Genève. The purpose of this event was, firstly, to provide an opportunity for delegates representing FIP constituencies and organisations in membership to get to know each other, and the FIP Board members and team. This networking opportunity is crucial for delegates to learn from one another, foster relationships, and explore future collaboration possibilities.

During the meet-and-greet, a set of twelve advocacy postcards, highlighting unique contributions made by pharmacists, based on data and evidence, with relevant references, was distributed to delegates. The postcards were developed based on [FIP Global Situational Report on Pharmacy](#).

2 FIP interventions at WHA79

The participation of FIP at the 79th WHA was marked by a series of impactful statements that reflected FIP's commitment to advancing pharmacists' contributions to addressing global health priorities. These statements included both individual statements, where FIP representatives presented FIP's perspective on specific agenda items, and constituency statements, which involved collaborative efforts with partner organisations and alliances.

In this section, we highlight the statements delivered by FIP at WHA79 and their relevance to our FIP priority programmes (Tables 2 and 3).

3 WHA side events

3.1 The FIP side events

3.3.1 FIP side event on self-care and primary health care

On Monday, 18 May 2026, FIP organised a side event in collaboration with Opella at the IFRC headquarters in Geneva. The event was titled “Self-care essential for PHC: Pharmacists critical for self-care and Universal Health Coverage”.

The side event brought together speakers from FIP, Opella, EOP and WHO to discuss the global health and policy impact of self-care, demonstrating how pharmacy workforce integration can support the implementation of the WHO Framework on self-care, and that pharmacy can support these policies with partners across all sectors.

The event was opened by Mr Paul Sinclair, FIP president, followed by scene-setting remarks from Dr Catherine Duggan, FIP CEO, who presented the importance of scaling up self-care as part of global efforts to strengthen PHC. She shared how FIP member organisations (MOs) are delivering self-care and a snapshot of FIP survey findings on self-care.

The programme included a presentation by Manjulaa Narasimhan, a scientist in the Department of Sexual, Reproductive, Maternal, Child, Adolescent, Aging Health and Research at the WHO, on “The global policy context of self-care and its impact on PHC”. Her contribution highlighted the WHO Conceptual Framework on Self-Care and the importance of self-care interventions across all countries and economic settings as a critical pathway to achieving UHC, promoting health, enhancing global health security, and serving vulnerable populations.

Josephine Fubara, Chief Science Officer, Opella, spoke on “Self-care only works when we work together: Delivering of self-care through collaboration”, sharing insights on existing misinformation on social media and how pharmacists lead self-care.

Wael Ali, EOP president and FIP Eastern Mediterranean Regional Pharmaceutical Forum president contributed on “Pharmacists delivering self-care in collaboration with patients”. His remarks focused on health literacy crises, how pharmacists are strengthening healthcare systems worldwide, and patient perspectives.

Marianne Ivey, FIP vice president, led the panel discussion. During the panel discussion, participants explored the role of pharmacists and other healthcare professionals in ensuring that self-care remains safe, evidence-based, accessible, and equitable for all populations. The discussion also focused on how pharmacists can support patients with varying levels of health literacy to effectively engage in self-care, and how the successful integration of self-care into PHC can be measured. The session featured active engagement from both panellists and participants, fostering a rich exchange of perspectives and experiences.

The side event reinforced the growing role of pharmacists in self-care and PHC, highlighting how the integration of the pharmacy workforce into PHC can strengthen health literacy, promote self-care, and improve health outcomes.

3.3.2 FIP side event on humanitarian action and access to medicines

On Tuesday, 19 May 2026, FIP organised a side event in collaboration with the IFRC at the IFRC headquarters in Geneva. The event was titled “Addressing the impact of complex crises on global health through safe and sustainable access to medicines and strengthening pharmaceutical contributions to humanitarian action”. The side event brought together speakers from FIP, IFRC and WHO to discuss the role of pharmacy and pharmaceutical systems in strengthening emergency preparedness, ensuring access to medicines, and supporting resilient and coordinated health system responses in humanitarian and crisis settings.

The event was opened by Mr Paul Sinclair, FIP president, followed by scene-setting remarks from Dr Catherine Duggan, FIP CEO, who highlighted FIP’s work in humanitarian action, emergency preparedness, access to medicines, and the role of pharmacists in supporting health system resilience.

The programme included a presentation by Rodrigo Cataldi, technical officer and technical lead on access to medicines in WHO’s NCDs and mental health department, on “Emergency preparedness and health systems: Global emergency frameworks and policy context”. His contribution addressed current global trends, WHO priorities, and the need for resilient, coordinated and responsive health systems during crises.

Petra Khoury, global director for health and care at IFRC, spoke on “Health system resilience and response”, sharing insights on strengthening health system resilience, coordinated emergency response, and ensuring continuity of care during crises.

Cecile Terraz, director for global humanitarian services and supply chain management at IFRC, contributed on “Securing medicine supply chains and quality in emergencies and complex settings”. Her remarks focused on strengthening supply chain resilience, ensuring safe and quality-assured medicine distribution, and addressing the impact of climate-related factors on medicine stability and expiry.

Raquel Martínez, FIP vice president and secretary general of the General Pharmaceutical Council of Spain, presented on “National to global learning: Pharmacy response in emergencies”. She shared lessons from Spain’s experience and highlighted the importance of pharmacy leadership, national preparedness, and cross-sector collaboration in emergency response.

The presentations were followed by a panel discussion titled “Strengthening emergency preparedness through pharmacy and partnerships”, moderated by Rob Moss, FIP vice president. The discussion explored the contribution of pharmacists and pharmaceutical systems to emergency preparedness, continuity of care, medicine access, supply chain resilience, and partnerships across health, humanitarian and policy sectors.

The side event reinforced the importance of integrating pharmacy into emergency preparedness and response frameworks and highlighted the value of collaboration between FIP, IFRC, WHO and national pharmacy organisations to support safe and sustainable access to medicines in complex crises.

3.3.3 FIP side event on tobacco cessation

FIP's third side event took place on Wednesday, 20 May 2026, at Hotel Royal, titled "Implementing the WHO FCTC and wider NCD prevention targets by integrating the pharmacy workforce". This event was supported by unrestricted funding from Kenvue.

This event included speakers from WHO, FCTC and FIP to discuss how the pharmacy workforce can assist with the FCTC implementation, leading to achieving wider NCD prevention targets. The objectives of the session were to:

- Highlight the importance of scaling up tobacco cessation as part of global NCD prevention strategies.
- Discuss how pharmacists and the wider pharmacy workforce can support the implementation of evidence-based tobacco cessation interventions.
- Share practical approaches to integrating tobacco cessation services within PHC and community settings.
- Identify policy and system-level actions to strengthen pharmacy-led cessation initiatives globally.

The event was opened by Dr Catherine Duggan, FIP CEO, showcasing the global burden of tobacco and the impact of tobacco on NCDs. Globally, both the WHO and the UN have strong commitments towards tobacco cessation through the WHO FCTC and the 2025 UN Political Declaration on NCDs. Over the years, FIP has shown professional leadership when it launched a holding statement on the use of electronic cigarettes in 2023, the WHO and FIP joint statement on the role of pharmacists in tobacco cessation in 2024, and the adoption of the FIP Statement of Policy on the role of pharmacists in establishing a future free from tobacco and nicotine dependence, also in 2024.

Dr Hebe Gouda is a technical officer for the Tobacco Free Initiative, Department of Health Prevention and Promotion at WHO. She discussed progress in tobacco control and tobacco cessation. It has been reported that only 31% of the world's population has access to comprehensive tobacco cessation services. When asked, only 50% of tobacco users reported that they had received brief advice through PHC. Dr Gouda ended with a strong call for action to pharmacists and pharmacy technicians: if each pharmacist reaches one smoker every working day for three years, close to 100 million smokers will quit during this period.

Dr Tibor Szilagyi, Team lead for reporting and knowledge management at the FCTC secretariat, discussed the role of pharmacists in tobacco cessation. The WHO FCTC is an evidence-based international public health treaty developed by governments which reflects a holistic, intersectoral, whole-of-government approach. Dr Szilagyi provided an overview of the relevant articles of the convention that could be linked to the work of pharmacists. He also shared excerpts from the 2025 global progress report on progress made by parties. He concluded by highlighting that health workers, including pharmacists, are role models and have a particular responsibility to set a good example in this respect. Those who use tobacco amongst them should be offered and provided programmes to quit.

In the presentation that followed, FIP vice presidents Luís Lourenço and John Pieper shared a summary of FIP's work on NCDs and tobacco cessation. Specific mention was made of FIP's Practice Transformation Programme on NCDs, digital events, and publications. FIP's presence at the 11th session of the Conference of the Parties (COP) to the WHO FCTC included a statement delivered by FIP vice president Daragh Connolly in November 2025. A new CPD Bite series titled "Supporting tobacco cessation: FIP CPD Bites series for pharmacists" commenced with the launch of the first episode during this session. Titled "Understanding the impact of second- and third-hand tobacco exposure on family members", this first episode focuses on an important yet often overlooked dimension of tobacco-related harm, with direct relevance to pharmacy practice.

An industry perspective was shared by Dr Roshan Varghese, Medical Affairs lead for smoking cessation at Kenvue. Research overwhelmingly shows the need for reassurance, advice and support, indicating that the role of the pharmacist is critical to success. However, he also warned that the use of vape products produces an increased threat to smoking cessation, as adolescents are nine times more likely to vape than adults.

The session concluded with a case study from Uruguay. Dr Virginia Olmos, FIP vice president and president of the Uruguayan Association of Chemistry and Pharmacy, reported that in 2006, Uruguay became the first smoke-free country in Latin America and one of the first in the world. This meant banning smoking in enclosed public spaces and workplaces, which represented a major cultural change. It also helped protect non-smokers from second-hand smoke and reinforced the message that tobacco control is a public health priority. Among adolescents, Uruguay also saw a very important reduction in cigarette consumption. However, prevention among young people must remain a priority. The increase in

the average age of initiation is positive, but continued education and prevention strategies are essential, especially to avoid new forms of nicotine dependence.

The session concluded with the strong message that pharmacists can play an active role at different moments of the cessation process. They can ask routinely about tobacco use, communicate risks in a clear and empathetic way, assess motivation to quit, and support structured programmes. This contribution is important because repeated, accessible and trusted interactions can make a real difference in patient outcomes.

The speech also showcased FIP's advocacy on expanding pharmacists' roles in vaccination promotion and administration, and reinforced the importance of integrating pharmacy services into people-centred, equitable and sustainable health systems.	 

3.3 FIP's contribution to other side events

In addition to FIP-led side events during WHA79, FIP representatives contributed to, supported, or were identified to contribute to several side events organised by partner organisations and external stakeholders. These engagements provided opportunities to strengthen pharmacy's visibility and contribution across key global health areas, including self-care, antimicrobial resistance, medicine supply and access, health workforce investment, HPV vaccination, migraine, and traditional medicine.

A summary of FIP's contribution to other side events is provided in the table.

3.6 Key summary notes from the side events

During the 79th WHA, FIP delegates actively participated in over 80 side events, contributing to high-level discussions on global health priorities. These sessions provided critical opportunities to advocate for the role of pharmacists and highlight their contributions to achieving universal health coverage and strengthening health systems. FIP's active presence ensured that the pharmacy profession was represented in a wide range of discussions, reinforcing our commitment to advancing global health through innovation, collaboration, and advocacy.

Ultimately, participants stressed that addressing complex global challenges such as health inequities, climate change, and future health emergencies will require not

It also highlighted the significant disparities between and within countries, ranging from access to healthy food, to ensuring access to food itself. Although pharmacists were not specifically recognised during the event, the discussions strongly aligned with the important role of pharmacists as members of primary healthcare teams in supporting NCD and mental health prevention and management, promoting health education, improving access to medicines, providing point-of-care testing and self-testing consultations, and advancing person-centred care.
18 May 2026	From gaps to gains: Delivering UHC through gender-responsive health systems	Significant global efforts are still needed to strengthen the prevention and management of NCDs and mental health.
18 May 2026	Locally led, globally scaled: The next phase of the Global Breast Cancer Initiative (GBCI)	The discussion highlighted the critical role of pharmacists in ensuring the safe delivery of oncology care and emphasised the importance of pharmacist expertise as an integral part of the multidisciplinary team. Participants also underscored the need to recognise and promote specialist pharmacy roles, supported by appropriate governance structures to ensure the safe and effective distribution and management of medicines.
19 May 2026	Harnessing AI and technology to advance nutritional care for children with non-communicable diseases	The event highlighted the potential of advanced technologies, including AI, to expand access to healthcare interventions, including nutritional care for children in underserved and remote areas. Participants emphasised that equitable access to AI-enabled health technologies is essential, noting that "AI without access is discrimination". The discussions also reinforced the importance of nutrition as a cornerstone of the prevention and management of NCDs. Strengthening multidisciplinary collaboration, including partnerships between pharmacists and nutritionists, was recognised as an important strategy to support person-centred care and improve health outcomes.
19 May 2026	Health is wealth: Why investing in health professionals pays off	The event underscored that investing in the health workforce is not merely a healthcare expenditure, but a long-term investment in stronger economies, resilient health systems, and improved patient outcomes. Participants highlighted that health systems should be viewed as a driver of economic prosperity, with recent global crises demonstrating the economic value of resilient healthcare systems. Discussions emphasised the need for adequate workforce planning, safe working conditions, interprofessional collaboration, and stronger links between evidence and policy. These messages are particularly relevant to the pharmacy profession, given the

		global shortage of pharmacists and the growing demand for their expertise in patient safety, multidisciplinary care, chronic disease management, and primary healthcare. Investing in pharmacy education, training, and workforce development was recognised as essential not only for improving healthcare quality and patient well-being but also for supporting economic resilience and sustainable health systems.
20 May 2026	Online safety: Artificial intelligence, social media and suicide prevention	The two-part event explored the opportunities and challenges of AI in healthcare alongside strategies to promote online safety and mental well-being, particularly among children and young people. Discussions highlighted the importance of distinguishing AI tools used in clinical practice from general AI applications. AI was recognised as a valuable tool for analysing large datasets and supporting the early identification of individuals at risk of suicide; however, participants stressed that AI cannot replace the empathy, trust, and human connection required to provide effective mental health support. The event also emphasised that ensuring online safety is a shared responsibility involving families, caregivers, technology companies, internet providers, policymakers, and communities. Participants noted the need for age-appropriate approaches that support individuals throughout childhood, adolescence, and young adulthood. The discussions highlighted the important role of pharmacists in promoting mental health awareness, identifying individuals at risk, signposting them to appropriate services, and mobilising community support as trusted and accessible healthcare professionals.
20 May 2026	Breakfast dialogue on global HPV vaccination strategy post-2030	The event highlighted the need to increase awareness of the health consequences of HPV infection beyond cervical cancer and to reduce the stigma associated with HPV-related cancers. Participants emphasised the importance of gender-neutral HPV vaccination programmes to ensure equitable protection for both girls and boys. The discussions reinforced the significant role of pharmacists in improving public awareness, addressing vaccine hesitancy, providing evidence-based education, and supporting the delivery of HPV vaccination programmes to increase vaccine uptake and contribute to cancer prevention.
20 May 2026	Delivering the road map for chronic respiratory disease care	The event focused on advancing the implementation of the global road map for chronic respiratory disease care, with discussions centred on strengthening prevention, early diagnosis, equitable access to treatment, and integrated long-term management of conditions such as asthma and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD). Participants emphasised the importance of strong primary healthcare systems, multidisciplinary collaboration, person-centred care, and supportive public health policies to reduce the global burden of chronic respiratory diseases. Although the role of pharmacists was not explicitly addressed during the session, a follow-up discussion with one of the organisers indicated that the integration of community pharmacy into future chronic respiratory disease care strategies and integrated care models is currently under consideration. This represents an important opportunity to strengthen recognition of pharmacists' contributions to disease prevention, early detection, patient education, adherence support, and the long-term management of chronic respiratory diseases.
20 May 2026	Shaping the future of brain health: What it means for economic growth	The event highlighted brain health as a critical investment for both population well-being and economic development. Discussions emphasised that promoting brain health and preventing, detecting, and effectively managing neurological and mental health conditions can contribute to healthier ageing populations, increased workforce productivity, stronger labour markets, greater innovation, and more sustainable economic growth. Participants noted that investing in neuroscience, brain health research, and the health workforce has the potential to stimulate job creation and drive economic development. Reducing the burden of conditions such as

		Alzheimer's disease, depression, and other neurological disorders can also lower long-term healthcare expenditures while improving quality of life. These discussions reinforce the important contribution of pharmacists in promoting brain health, supporting early detection and appropriate management, optimising medicines use, and providing ongoing care as part of multidisciplinary healthcare teams.
20 May 2026	NextGen x NowGen: Futureproofing health in the climate era	The session highlighted climate change as an urgent global health crisis with far-reaching implications for food security, infectious diseases, mental health, population displacement, and health system resilience. A central theme was the need to move beyond symbolic youth participation towards meaningful and institutionalised engagement in health governance and policy development. Discussions emphasised the importance of intergenerational collaboration, climate-resilient and digitally enabled health systems, community-led solutions, and international cooperation to address health inequities and strengthen pandemic preparedness. The discussions were highly relevant to the pharmacy profession, highlighting pharmacists' contributions to climate-resilient healthcare systems through disease prevention, public health preparedness, resilient medicine supply chains, health promotion, digital health, and equitable access to care. The event also reinforced the importance of empowering early-career healthcare professionals, including pharmacists, to actively contribute to climate-health policies and global health governance.
21 May 2026	Geneva Digital Health Day 2026 Track 1: NCDs & mental health	Digital transformation in health goes beyond technology and applications. It requires ethical and responsible use of data, stronger health systems, improved digital literacy, and effective governance. The failure of digital health systems in more than 40 countries highlights the importance of these elements. Multisectoral collaboration is essential to advance digital health and mental health agendas, particularly in the context of limited global funding for mental health, which remains below 2% of total health funding. Digital health can support the entire NCD care pathway, from prevention and early detection to follow-up, treatment adherence, and rehabilitation. Successful solutions should be inclusive, interoperable, secure, and human-centred. Country examples included national digital self-help applications, integrated NCD platforms, and remote rehabilitation services. These initiatives demonstrated the importance of embedding data within broader health systems to inform decision-making and policy development. Participants emphasised the need to position mental health as a development priority, build comprehensive digital mental health ecosystems, integrate clinical decision-support systems, and strengthen collaboration and knowledge-sharing across sectors. Adolescent mental health was highlighted as a key area for investment. Digital tools should be tailored to young people's needs, with particular attention to content quality, integration into existing systems, and effective implementation.
21 May 2026	Geneva Digital Health Day 2026 Track 2: Building resilient health systems in times of crisis	Climate change is increasingly affecting population health, particularly among individuals living with noncommunicable diseases (NCDs) and other vulnerable groups. During the session, representatives from the space and global health community highlighted the role of satellite technologies in supporting the health sector before, during, and after disasters. By collecting and analysing geospatial data, satellites provide actionable insights that facilitate early warning systems, evidence-based policymaking, and the development of innovative digital health applications. These efforts rely on strong collaboration and interoperability among multiple agencies and stakeholders.

		Satellite-enabled technologies can also enhance access to healthcare services through e-health solutions, helping connect underserved populations with needed care. Moreover, satellite-based observation systems support early detection of environmental and health threats, strengthening preparedness, proactive risk management, and emergency response capacities. Despite these advances, significant challenges remain, including the need for integrated data systems, the closure of surveillance gaps, the use of advanced analytics to strengthen monitoring, and improved global coordination. The session also highlighted the value of geospatial artificial intelligence (AI) and Geographic Tracking Systems (GTS) in promoting health equity. These tools can generate detailed data on the distribution of poverty and other social determinants of health across regions, particularly in low- and middle-income countries (LMICs). Such information is critical for guiding targeted interventions, supporting immunisation programmes, and ensuring that resources are allocated to the populations most in need.
23 May 2026	Rethinking global health in a changing world	This side event highlighted that global health is undergoing a major transition driven by geopolitical shifts, constrained financing, and increasing fragmentation of traditional aid-dependent models. A central message was the need to move from donor dependency toward health sovereignty, through intentional, country-led and self-sustaining health systems capable of withstanding economic and political shocks. Within this transition, strategic philanthropy was framed as a catalytic tool to de-risk investments, bridge funding gaps, and strengthen domestic capacities rather than replace long-term public financing. Participants emphasised that achieving true health sovereignty also requires strengthening national regulatory systems to ensure safe, equitable, and reliable access to essential medicines and innovations. At the same time, the discussion underscored persistent fragmentation in global health governance and financing, which continues to hinder the translation of political commitments—particularly in areas such as noncommunicable diseases and mental health—into implementation. Overall, the session called for a more coherent, resilient, and integrated global health ecosystem that aligns financing, governance, and accountability to support sustainable and equitable health outcomes.

4 Highlights from the WHO-FIP meeting during WHA79

During WHA79, FIP held a high-level meeting with colleagues from the WHO at WHO headquarters in Geneva on 20 May 2026. The meeting provided an important opportunity to strengthen the long-standing collaboration between FIP and WHO, review shared priorities, and discuss areas for continued engagement under the FIP-WHO collaboration plan 2025–2027.

The meeting was attended by FIP president Mr Paul Sinclair, FIP CEO Dr Catherine Duggan, FIP vice presidents, and the FIP team, demonstrating the strong commitment of the FIP Board to advancing global collaboration with WHO and ensuring that the pharmacy profession is recognised as an essential part of the health workforce.

Discussions focused on shared priorities across workforce development, access to medicines, prevention, immunisation, patient safety, NCDs, substandard and falsified medicines, education, and the contribution of pharmacists to resilient and people-centred health systems. FIP also highlighted the importance of stronger recognition of pharmacists within global health workforce frameworks and the value of FIP's data, expertise and global network in supporting WHO priorities.

The meeting reaffirmed the importance of continued WHO-FIP engagement and identified opportunities to further strengthen collaboration across agreed areas of work. Follow-up will include continued coordination with relevant WHO colleagues, further discussion on priority actions, and a proposed follow-up meeting in approximately six months to review progress and maintain momentum.

6 FIP's growing impact at the WHA: A reflection on the past four years

For the past four years, FIP has increased its presence and impact during the WHA week. Following the pandemic, the WHO placed a greater focus on member states for the assembly agenda, which meant side events increased and gave an opportunity for non-state actors (NSAs) to broaden participation and engagement. We ensured an increased delegation of FIP Board members and representatives from FIP member organisations since 2023. An increasing number of delegates can now attend more side events and amplify the efforts of FIP during this important week on the global health calendar.

This broader presence pursued six objectives:

1. Increase the profile and presence of pharmacy as integral to global health;
2. Influence the global health agenda through policy statements (either as FIP or in collaboration with other stakeholders and partners, e.g., WHPA);
3. Ensure pharmacy is present at as many side events as possible;
4. Support the side events of our partners, stakeholders and members;
5. Host a side event, if possible and feasible;
6. Network, collaborate, socialise.

FIP greatly benefits from the larger delegation at the WHA, which allows the federation to attend more events, engage in networking, and increase the presence of pharmacy in Geneva. This wider delegation includes the FIP Board, FIP Section representatives and member organisations, who are willing to join forces with FIP to deliver this mission.

Beyond the plenary, FIP delegates participated in and, where feasible, co-hosted multiple side-events, reinforcing pharmacy's contributions to PHC, patient safety, and resilient health systems. Through these combined actions, FIP ensured that the voice of pharmacy was heard consistently across the WHA's deliberations and that the profession remains recognised as an essential partner in achieving global health goals.

7 Conclusions

FIP's participation at the WHA continues to grow each year in both presence and impact.

This increasing engagement reflects the strong commitment not only from the FIP Board but also from FIP's organisations in membership and constituencies. FIP's advocacy message—"Think Health. Think Pharmacy"—is gaining greater recognition year after year. The more that FIP delegates engage, the more visible and valued the contributions of pharmacists become on the global stage.

As we conclude our fourth year of a wider, coordinated, engaged FIP delegation to the WHA, we are proud of the impact we have made in shaping global health discussions and increasing awareness of the impact of our profession. The growing number of events where our delegation presents or speaks testifies that our actions and presence is noticed. These achievements would not have been possible without the support of the FIP Board, our organisations in membership, and our wider network of committed professionals.

Looking ahead, we will continue to champion the role of pharmacists, pharmacy educators and pharmaceutical scientists across all aligned priorities and work collaboratively with other healthcare professionals, organisations, and stakeholders to advance healthcare for all, leaving no one behind. The insights and experiences gained over the past four years will continue to inform our priorities, ensuring that FIP's efforts remain aligned with the global health agenda and contribute meaningfully to policies that empower pharmacists worldwide.

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
