AIM: to explore home care nurses' perceptions about their role in interprofessional collaboration in clinical medication reviews and the requirements to assume their role









Interprofessional collaboration in clinical medication reviews

POPULATION/OUTCOMES



Interviews
12 level 6 nurses



Nursing activities & requirements + 3 case-vignettes:

DRPs/patient preferences observed by community pharmacists in previous reviews

FINDINGS

STRIP (Systematic Tool to Reduce Inappropriate Prescribing) method + nurses' activities

* Preparation

Providing medication-related information (potential problems, preferences)

- * Pharmacotherapeutic anamnesis
- * Pharmacotherapeutic analysis
- * Interprofessional discussion + proposing pharmaceutical care plan
- * Shared-decision making with the patient and/or informal caregiver
 Assist in checking and correcting a patient's understanding of information
 about implemented changes in the pharmaceutical care plan
- * Monitoring and following-up implemented actions

 Providing medication-related information (potential therapeutic effects)





CONCLUSION
