### **FIP Council Approves QA Policy Statement**

During 69th World Congress of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences in Istanbul, FIP Council approved the FIP Statement of Policy on Quality Assurance of Pharmacy Education. The statement recommends that “in order to support the development of an adequate and appropriate pharmacy workforce and the academic and institutional infrastructure to deliver the required competency-based education and training, each country should have its own standards-based system for the quality assurance of pharmacy education.”

According to the statement, a standards-based Quality Assurance system should:

- Reflect the vision for pharmacy practice and education that has been developed through profession-wide consensus
- Allow appropriate input from all stakeholders, including students and the public
- Ensure that educational programs are evidence and competency-based, of high quality and meet the needs of the people, the pharmacists and their country
- Evaluate programmatic outcomes as well as institutional structures and processes
- Be transparent and be free of inappropriate influences and appearances of conflicts of interest in its development and implementation
- Promote and foster self-assessment and continuous quality improvement of educational institutions
- Be accountable to the appropriate governmental authorities

The statement also recommends and encourages action by National Governments, Regulatory and Quality Assurance Organisations, Member Organisations, and Universities, Colleges and Schools of Pharmacy. It is meant to be a companion piece to FIP’s *Statement of Policy on Good Pharmacy Education Practice* and is supported by the *Global Framework for Quality Assurance of Pharmacy Education*.

### **Consultation report published**

The report from the 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Global Pharmacy Education Consultation, held in September at FIP Congress 2009 in Istanbul, as well as presentations given by the Taskforce team are available to download from the COP Library under “ Taskforce consultations and events” or the website: <http://drop.io/PETconsultation>.

It was a very successful session, with more than 120 attendees. Several activities emerged across the roundtable discussion with regard to a potential role for of FIP in pharmacy education:

- (1) FIP should continue to strengthen partnerships with global organisations such as UNESCO and WHO, and also facilitate the formation of new partnerships at the regional and national level with Ministries of Education and Health, universities, professional bodies, regulators and accreditation organisations.
- (2) FIP should be an advocate for pharmacy education in activities to
  - a. encourage pharmacists to undertake teacher training
  - b. encourage academic institutions to implement the Quality Assurance Framework and other types of self-assessment
  - c. develop key messages about the role of pharmacists and pursue resolutions at the WHO-level
  - d. promote needs-based education
  - e. establish a World Pharmacy Day
- (3) FIP can provide opportunities, tools and resources for
  - a. Joint research, especially in developing countries
  - b. Teacher training
  - c. Student assessment
  - d. Continuing professional development

The Taskforce and FIP will be reviewing the recommendations/ideas from the consultation participants and will be putting together an action plan for post-2010 work.
